Oblates

Oblates are Christian men and women from any walk of life who join with like-minded individuals to develop and grow spiritually in the context of a formal and on-going program of prayer, study, learning, reflection and sharing in the tradition of Benedictine monastic spirituality. Oblates become affiliated with the monastery and join with the monks in their prayer and spiritual life.

For more information on the Oblate Chapter at Glastonbury, there is a comprehensive description on the Abbey's website. The Glastonbury chapter meets on the first Tuesday of each month, beginning with Compline at 7:15 in the Abbey church, starting in August. Newcomers spend a year as Oblate Observers and meet in class with a monk to learn the foundations of Benedictine spirituality. New Observer classes begin each Fall.

Retreats 2017 - 2018

Glastonbury Abbey welcomes individuals and groups seeking a peaceful environment for respite and reflection. We also provide lodging and meals for programmed, guided and private retreats. Weekend programs are described below. A \$70.00 non-refundable reservation deposit is required.



September 14, 2017 - The First Grader 1 Hour 45 minutes PG13 The Kenyan government introduces a free education system, which attracts an unlikely applicant. An old man who fought for his country's independence from British rule wants to learn how to read. A kindly teacher helps him gain admission, but faces opposition from parents a nd officials who see it as a waste of a school place. Fact-based drama, starring Oliver Litondo and Naomie Harris.

October 26, 2017 – The Innocents 1 hour 55 minutes PG13 In 1945 Warsaw, a French Red Cross doctor (Lou de Laage) is called to a convent on an urgent matter. Once there, she not only helps a nun give birth, but discovers that several other women at the monastery are also pregnant. Soon, she is tasked with keeping the secret of what happened at the convent during World War II. Directed by Anne Fontaine, The Innocents made its world premiere at the 2016 Sundance Film Festival.

November 30, 2017 - Shadowland 2 Hours 11 minutes PG C.S. Lewis, the author of the "Chronicles of Narnia" books, known as Jack, teaches at Oxford during the 1950s. An American fan, Joy Gresham, arrives to meet him for tea in Oxford. It is the beginning of a love affair. Tragically, Joy becomes terminally ill and their lives become complicated.



March 22, 2018 - On The Waterfront 1 Hour 48 minutes Not Rated

On The Waterfront is the story of the men who had the courage to stand up to the corrupt longshoreman's union, which is controlled by Johnny (Lee J. Cobb). One of Johnny's top aides is Charley (Rod Steiger), whose brother Terry (Marlon Brando), a former prize-fighter, is treated almost like a mascot by Johnny -- he makes sure that Terry gets the best work assignments. After Terry unwittingly contributes to the death of a man named Joey, who dared to speak out about union corruption, Joey's sister Edie (Eva Marie Saint) goes to local priest Father Barry (Karl Malden) for help. Father Barry sets up a meeting to talk about what's going on, but everyone is too scared to speak up. Finally a man named Dugan (Pat Henning) agrees to talk, but tragedy strikes again. Meanwhile, Terry and Edie fall in love -- but Terry's troubles are just beginning.

April 12, 2018 - Trumbo 2 Hours 4 minutes R

In 1947, Dalton Trumbo (Bryan Cranston) was Hollywood's top screen-writer until he and other artists were jailed and blacklisted for their political beliefs. TRUMBO (directed by Jay Roach) recounts how Dalton used words and wit to win two Academy Awards and expose the absurdity and injustice under the blacklist, which entangled everyone from gossip columnist Hedda Hopper (Helen Mirren) to John Wayne, Kirk Douglas and Otto Preminger.

The Book of Revelation: A New Creation Celia Sirois – September 5, 12, 19, 26 and October 3, 2017

The Book of Revelation, also known as The Apocalypse, while piquing peoples' curiosity is seldom read, much lest studied. This course will be an introduction to this esoteric literature.

Celia Sirois teaches Sacred Scripture in the Master of Arts in Ministry Program at St. John's Seminary, Brighton. She also directs the CHRISM (Christian Responsibility in Shared Ministry) program, an adult Scripture study program available to the parishes of the South Region of the Archdiocese of Boston.



The Reformation: Ancient History or Contemporary Reality Fr. Nicholas Morcone, OSB October 10, 17, 24 and November 7, 2017

As we celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation, we will attempt to look at the Church of the middle ages, the causes and focus of the Protestant Reformation, the Catholic response and the long term effects of the religious, social economic and political upheaval.

Week III. The Catholic Reformation

Week IV. The post-reformation world

Father Nicholas, OSB of Glastonbury Abbey has been a lifelong student of history since he majored in it in college. He has presented several programs on Church History here at the Abbey over the years.

Adult Christianity: Beyond the Catechism Fr. Timothy Joyce, OSB STL Friday mornings - 10:00 to 11:30 а.м. October 13, 20, 27 and November 3, 2017

This four week course will discuss the nature of faith today as seen in:

- the historical development of our understanding of our Christian faith, especially since the II Vatican Council;
- the importance of the Bible and the early Church;
- how modern science, the ecological movement and world events have shaped our insights;
- the recovery of the mystical tradition of the church;
- how we might have a richer, more mature understanding of our Christian tradition.

Participants will be invited to grow as more reflective disciples of Christ.

Father Timothy is a monk of Glastonbury Abbey. He holds an advanced degree in systematic theology from the Gregorian University in Rome. He is a published author as well as preacher and retreat director.

The Neuroscience of Mindfulness John Sheff November 14, 2017

This lecture will describe the "emotional brain," how it functions, and specific mindfulness techniques useful for managing depression, anxiety and substance abuse. Neuroplasticity is your friend. Learn to activate it.

Worry: Why Are You Wasting Your Time? John Sheff November 21, 2017

The goal of this lecture is to help you to become an efficient worrier, not someone waiting for the other shoe to drop. This lecture will be your new software package. Once installed and practiced, you will have more time in your life for pleasure.

Each year a different general topic is presented and speakers are engaged to address it from the perspective of their own faith tradition. The topic for the series year 2017-2018 is *Do Justice and Live in the Presence of God.* (Inspired by Psalm 15) Please join us to hear the below listed speakers.

October 19, 2017: Rabbi William Hamilton — Walking in God's Ways - Lessons from Abraham Joshua Heschel

"When I marched in Selma, my feet were praying," wrote Rabbi Heschel (1907-1972). There is probably no better place to start an exploration of "doing justice" than with this great soul who put his philosophy into practice as a civil rights activist, anti-war demonstrator, and American Jewish representative at Vatican II calling for change to anti-Semitic language in the Catholic liturgy. Rabbi William Hamilton, leader of Congregation Kehillath Israel in Brookline, MA, will examine this year's theme through the lens of Heschel's life and discuss what the renowned theologian has to say to our current culture.

Rabbi Hamilton, a nationally-known lecturer and passionate advocate of Heschel's teachings, has been with Congregation Kehillath Israel, a Conservative synagogue, since 1995. He serves as Chaplain of the Massachusetts State Police and is a trustee for the Anti-Defamation League. He is the recipient of the Jewish Federation's (Combined Jewish Philanthropies) 2001 Rabbinic Leadership Award and also received a Safe Havens Vision Award for working to prevent domestic violence. This lecture is sponsored by Temple Beth Sholom, Hull, and Congregation Sha'aray Shalom, Hingham.

November 16, 2017: Ani Zonneveld — The Pursuit of Justice in Islam and Understanding How It Got Away

"Muslims for Progressive Values" may sound like a contradiction in terms to anyone who defines Islam by daily news headlines. But Ani Zonneveld, founder and president of this faith-based grassroots movement, is working to change misperceptions and present the egalitarian heart of her religion. "How did the concepts of mercy and justice, the very essence of the Quran, become distorted and unfulfilled by many of its followers?" she asks. "What is the ethics of Sharia and the human rights language of Islam?"

Ms. Zonneveld, who a singer/song writer and author, will answer the questions in a program of talk and music. Born and raised in Malaysia, she is now based in Los Angeles and has seen her advocacy for peace, women's equality, and gay rights become an international network of chapters taking root not only in her native country, but in the US, Canada, France, Germany, Australia, Bangladesh, Chile, the Netherlands, Burundi and Tunisia.



January 18, 2018: Sr. Barbara Reid, OP — Doing Justice and Gender Equality: Biblical Perspectives

Women have been partners in the faith journey since Genesis and their influence can be found in the Bible's male-centric text if a seeker knows where to look. Sr. Barbara Reid, Professor of New Testament Studies, and Vice President and Academic Dean at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago, has been such a seeker all her life. She will discuss how modern day gender equity movements have their roots in the women of Scripture who advocated for justice, and in the biblical images of a just and merciful God who appeared in both male and female form. Professor Reid will also talk about ways of interpreting Scripture that lead toward justice.

Sr. Barbara Reid is a Dominican Sister of Grand Rapids, Michigan. Sr. Barbara holds a Masters from Aquinas College in Religious Studies, and a Ph.D. in Biblical Studies from The Catholic University of America, in Washington, D.C. She is currently general editor of *The Wisdom Commentary*, that will be a 58-volume series of feminist interpretations of the books of the Bible, which Liturgical Press began publishing in 2015. She is the author of numerous books, including *Taking Up the Cross: New Testament Interpretations Through Latina and Feminist Eyes*, and *Women in the Gospel of Luke*.





February 15, 2018: Rev. Mariama White-Hammond The Great Cloud of Witness - What Our Ancestors Teach Us

Addressing the 2017 Boston Women's March, Rev. Mariama White-Hammond opened the historic proceedings by telling the crowd of 175,000 that she owed a great debt to her mother, (Rev. Gloria White-Hammond), her grandmother, and all the forebears she didn't even know. In that same spirit she will reflect on Hebrews 12:1: "Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us." She will talk about the Civil Rights Movement, the importance of ancestors in the Black spiritual tradition, and how connecting with history can be a source of strength for building a better future.

Rev. Mariama is an ordained minister in the African Methodist Episcopal Church and serves as Interim Youth Pastor and Minister for Ecological Justice at Bethel AME Church in Jamaica Plain. She majored in International Relations at Stanford University, studied abroad in Chile, and holds a Masters in Divinity from the Boston University School of Theology.

March 15, 2018: Rev. Gregory J. Boyle SJ Save the World...or Savor it? Being Reached by the Widow, Orphan, and Stranger

Jesus took four things seriously, says Father Boyle: inclusion, non-violence, unconditional loving-kindness, and acceptance. As the founder of Homeboy Industries in Los Angeles, Father Boyle has spent 30 years working to put those tenets into practice by reaching out to men and women in prisons and street gangs. He will talk about that work and reflect on the original covenant between God and God's people. As pastor of Dolores Mission Church in East LA in the 1980s Father Boyle organized the parish and community to respond to escalating gang violence by forming "Jobs for a Future," offering training, day care, and work in an abandoned building that became Homeboy Bakery.

Father Boyle is the recipient of the 2017 University of Notre Dame Laetare Medal and is the author of the bestselling book, *Tattoos on the Heart: The Power of Boundless Compassion.* His latest book is *Barking to the Choir: The Power of Radical Kinship* (November, 2017, Simon & Schuster).

April 19, 2018: Razia Jan Doing Justice in the Afghan Classroom: Empowering Women and Girls

She is called "the Mother of Deh'Subz." That's a district 30 miles northeast of Kabul and home to the Zabuli Education Center and the Razia Jan Institute. Both are a long way from Duxbury, MA, where Ms. Jan ran her tailoring and dry cleaning shop for 38 years. But the Afghan native always looked back, determined to improve educational opportunities for girls in her country, and raising the money here and abroad to do it. She also had many meetings with community elders in Afghanistan, gaining their trust and support. The education center, named for the late Afghan philanthropist, Abdul Madjid Zabuli, opened in 2008 and provides free courses, meals and uniforms to more than 600 disadvantaged Afghan girls in grades K-12. The institute, which opened in 2017, is offering advanced training in health/midwifery and office administration.

Ms. Jan, who has received numerous awards, including being voted one of CNN's Top Ten Heroes in 2012, is testimony to what one person with vision can do.

The Easter Triduum 2018

Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil make up the Easter Triduum, a single celebration of the Paschal Mystery spread over three days, the center and high point of which is the Easter Vigil. The liturgies of the Easter Triduum — the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, the Good Friday Celebration of the Lord's Passion and the Easter Vigil — "tell the story" that stands at the core of the Christian faith. They celebrate with grandeur the abiding significance of these sacred events in the lives of people today.

To help people understand and participate in these liturgies, the monastic community provides a series of lessons explaining the rites and meanings of each Triduum liturgy. These classes, held at the Morcone Center, and the liturgies occur as follows:

Psalms and Canticles in Morning and Evening Prayer Deacon Tim O'Donnell, S.T.L.

This course combines a study of some Biblical prayers with an introduction, both historical and practical, to Morning and Evening Prayer, where these prayers form the core, in the *Liturgy of the Hours* and *Benedictine Daily Prayer: A Short Breviary*. We will identify the main types of Psalms (such as praise, thanksgiving, lament, and Zion) and situate them in the worship of ancient Israel and the tradition of Christian prayer. Then the two great canticles known as the Benedictus and the Magnificat will be studied as developments of the Psalms and as reflections on the incarnation in Luke 1. We will see how these texts have been woven into the structure of Morning and Evening Prayer, and how these texts can be used both as prayer and as a practice for regular reflection on Scripture. Texts will be provided, but bring a personal Bible and one of the above prayer books if you have one. No previous Scripture study or experience with this prayer practice is required.
