


The Rev. Cynthia Bourgeault is an internationally acclaimed writer and retreat leader and a frequent teacher at Glastonbury Abbey. She was a close student of Thomas Keating for three decades and is the author of two books on Centering Prayer plus an extended teaching commentary of Thomas Keating's final work, THE SECRET EMBRACE. In this haiku-like final teaching, Thomas Keating encapsulates a lifetime's wisdom in eight haiku-like poems, exploring such insights as surrender, nondual awakening, divine creativity, and joy. Ted Jones is Thomas Keating's nephew and accompanied him closely during the final months of his life and at his death. He is a teacher of Buddhist Insight Meditation and lives in Newburyport, MA.

These poems will be the subject of Cynthia's and Ted's exploration. The day will also include two periods of centering prayer and time for questions and dialogue.

September 23, Thursday

"The Prophets, Jesus and the Prophetic Voice Today"

This presentation will focus on the Jewish prophets and their recurrent call to the people of Israel to return to covenant relationship with the God who chose them from among all people. It will also describe Jesus as the Christian fulfillment of that call and how it continues to surface throughout history in the voices of those who speak truth to power on behalf of God's sense of justice for all people, especially the most vulnerable among us.

Peter W. Gyves, SJ, MD

Father Gyves is the founder and director of *A Faith That Does Justice, Inc.*, an interfaith organization that raises consciousness about social issues affecting the most vulnerable among us. He entered the Society of Jesus in 2003 and



was ordained a priest in 2008. He has lived and worked in several countries outside the United States, both as a physician and a priest, including El Salvador and Guatemala during their civil wars of the 1980's and early 1990's.

Father Gyves has degrees from Boston College (B.S., 1973. M.A. – Theology, 1994), Georgetown University (M.D., 1978), Johns Hopkins University (M.P.H., 2005), and Weston School of Theology (STL., 2008).

October 7, Thursday, and October 12,19, 26, Tuesday:

"Still Catholic? The Reasons I Stay – The Reasons I May Leave?"

The Saint John's Bible is the first hand-written and illuminated Bible commissioned by a Benedictine Monastery in 500 years. The monks at St. John's Abbey and University in Collegeville, Minnesota, contracted Donald Jackson, calligrapher to the crown of the United Kingdom, to produce this Bible.

Following some remarks about St. John's Abbey and Donald Jackson, this talk will discuss how the Bible was produced using both ancient and contemporary tools and examine some illuminations: the magnificent Creation, frontispiece for Genesis, and those for each of the four gospels. The Abbey hopes this Bible will ignite the spiritual imagination of contemporary people throughout the world. It is a prophetic witness to the Word of God.

Regina Boisclair

Dr. Regina Boisclair started her career as a university librarian. She then pursued degrees in biblical studies at Providence College, Yale Divinity School, the Ecole Biblique et Archeologie Francaise de Jerusalem and a PhD from Temple University. She



taught at Merrimack College, Temple University, University of San Diego and Alaska Pacific University where she held the Cardinal Newman Chair of Catholic Theology for twenty years. Currently she is a participant in the on-line project "The Bible In Its Traditions" with the Ecole Biblique in Jerusalem and a task-force of the Catholic Biblical Association of America concerned with the Sunday readings appointed from Hebrews.
